JIMENEZ: **UP** TO LEAD THE WAY



UP to lead the way to improving the quality of education in other SUC's

ddressing the graduating class of the University of the Philippines-Diliman, UP President Angelo Jimenez announced that UP would lead efforts to democratize access to quality tertiary education by helping improve the quality of education in other state universities and colleges (SUCs).

In his commencement address, delivered on July 30th via a video recording due to inclement weather, Jimenez pointed out that "as the national university, we are mandated under Republic Act 9500, the law revising the UP Charter, to lead in higher education."

The labor lawyer reminded the UPD Class of 2023 that of the 114 SUCs in the country, UP gets 20% of the national budget for higher education.

"We all know there is a huge gap overall between the quality of UP education and the rest of the SUCs. No other public tertiary educational institution in the Philippines has ever landed among the top 1000 in global rankings." lamented Jimenez.

The UP President said it is paradoxical "that access to our university, which we love to call the University of the People, is very difficult for

the people."

"I believe in democratic access to UP education. And I believe that is best done by helping improve the quality of education in other SUCs."

Jimenez said this would be more equitable as a student would not have to go to UP to access a UP-level education.

"At the same time," said the Butuan native, "we can review the UPCAT and our equityexcellence formulas to give our disadvantaged a better fighting chance."

UP, the Commission on Higher Education (CHED), and other SUCs are set to hold the first UP-SUC Summit on Excellence and Equity in Public Higher Education on September 15. The summit aims to achieve the following objectives:

- To discuss strategies for overcoming challenges in establishing and maintaining linkages between universities;
- To promote sharing best practices and innovative approaches in academic, research, and public service collaboration:
- To identify opportunities for graduate education, student and faculty exchange, joint research, and sharing of educational resources and other academic and research activities; and,
- ◆ To establish a framework for sustainable and effective collaboration between UP, CHED, and other SUCs by signing an undertaking or a Memorandum of Understanding that outlines the key points of agreement among the participants.



MINUTES: 2023 SPRING GENERAL MEETING



Donnelly Park Turlock, CA June 10, 2023

- I. Call to Order: President Susan Mendiola called the meeting to order at 12:25 PM. Susan thanked the attendees for their presence and support. There were 18 attendees composed of members, family and friends from the North and South Areas.
- II. Prayer/UP Beloved: Prayer before lunch was led by Elnora Bugay. UP Beloved was led by Johnny Abilay.
- III. Introduction: UPAACC members, family and friends introduced themselves.
- IV. Secretary's Report: Minutes of the 2022 Summer General Meeting on June 11, 2022 and Board Meeting on November 5, 2022 were published in the newsletter. The members silently reviewed the minutes. Nenita Dean moved the approval of the 2022 General meeting minutes, seconded by Jet Belleza. Renee moved the approval of the 2022 Board meeting minutes, seconded by Lydia Favor. The minutes were approved.
- V. Treasurer's Report: Rey Elizondo presented the Treasurer's report in the absence of Annabelle Atienza. Copies of the financial report as of June 10, 2023 were distributed. The summary is shown below:

B. Comments:

Renee Smith asked if there is any maximum required by the State. The response was that under \$50K is acceptable. There were suggestions to increase the scholarship money or two campuses per year. President Susan Mendiola mentioned that Wilma Cabacungan's children would continue to support the scholarship program.

Boots Mayol suggested to move some

money to CD (from the savings account) to earn more interest for six months or one vear. Boots proposed to put \$10,000 to CD and keep the balance (~\$12K) in the savings account. Renee Smith seconded the motion. Nenita Dean mentioned that banks have certain requirements regarding CD and should be checked. The membership approved the motion to transfer \$10K from the saving account to CD.

Action: Susan Mendiola would check the bank rates and requirements. Gemma Biscocho moved to approve the Treasurer's Report, seconded by Renee Smith. The Treasurer's Report was approved.

VI. President's Report: Susan Mendiola announced the new UP President is Angelo Jimenez and requested the members to look at the current newsletter (Spring, 2023) for details about him.

Susan also mentioned that any news about UP can be accessed at Alumni site, UP Office of Alumni Association. She noticed that other UP Associations publish their donations to UP. Susan requested that our Association be transparent and inform the Alumni site of our donations.

Cheryll Villena informed the group that Ted Herbosa. UP Medicine 1983, is the new Secretary of the Department of Health of the Philippines (DOH).

VII. Project Update:

A. UPAACC-Crisologo Cabacungan Scholarship: Johnny Abilay reported that the last two scholars graduated Magna Cum Laude. One graduated with a degree in Political Science, the other with a degree in Community Nutrition.

Johnny added that the new scholar from UP Los Banos is John Paul Balines, a sophomore student in Industrial Engineering, and he would need a laptop after completing the 2nd semester (2022-23) with a GPA of 1.6083. Starting the 1st semester (2023-24), John is transferring to UP Diliman to pursue a BS degree in Tourism. UP Office of Scholarships and Student Services (OSSS) oversees the selection the scholar. As of August 8, 2023, the balance amount of our scholarship is PhP1.417 million in the scholarship fund (~\$25,300).

Action: Rey would arrange the zoom meeting to meet the scholars.

B. Balik Scientist - Dairy Cattle Project: Susan Mendiola referred to the information provided in UPAACC newsletter minutes of the Board Meeting on November 5, 2022. Johnny Abilay provided updates including the change of grades requirements from 2.5 to 2.75 in the MOU; the retirement of the Chairman of Scholarship Committee at UP Los Banos; the balance of PhP100,000 increased to PhP301.000 submitted to the business office; and lastly, one scholar has graduated.

Rev asked the members' opinion on whether to continue the program or not. Susan Mendiola referred to two motions discussed at the Board Meeting on 11/5/2022 that need approval at the general meeting. The two motions were: 1) moving \$1,500 for supplies and equipment, 2) to approve the project on a year-to-year basis.

He moved for approval to move \$1,500 for supplies and equipment, and other priorities. Lydia Favor seconded. The motion was approved.

Boots Mayol moved for approval that Balik Scientist project be approved on a year- to -year basis. Renee Smith seconded. The motion was approved.

- C. Computer Donation (2023): This year's (2023) recipient of the \$1,000 computer donation is UP Iloilo. August Lansigan is initiating contact with campus administra-
- D. Fund Raising Drive for 2023 Lydia Favor presented the UP sweatshirt design. The cost per unit is PhP800 (~\$14.30) for a minimum of 25 orders. The members asked clarifications on the design and gave some suggestions. Finally, the members agreed on Rey' suggestions:

Option 1 - Maroon sweatshirt with small front logo and UPAACC (in gold letters) underneath the logo (front only).

Option 2 - Same as above but with small "University of the Philippines" (in gold letters) on the back of the sweat shirt.

The members approved Option 1 (see page 7).

Action: Lydia Favor to ask further about the price. Rey Elizondo to include the information in the newsletter (see page 7). Order can begin during Fall.

- E. Annual Gift Program: \$150 received from Elnora Bugay and \$100 from Fe Castro. Both donations are for the general fund.
- F. Membership Drive: There are 11 new members. Kudos to Orly Dyoco for

UPAACC Charter Member Elena Buensalido Mangahas has just recently been inducted as the President of the Rotary Club of Central Stockton (RCCS).


